AWAKENED BY LIGHT: AN ADVENT JOURNEY Weekdays will not include reflection due to limited space, Read scripture passage, reflect on quote and respond to question & prayer.

Third Sunday of Advent (Gaudete Sunday)

Matthew 11:2-11 "Go and tell John what you hear and see: the blind regain their sight, the lame walk, lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the poor have the good news proclaimed to them."

Reflection: John wasn't expecting this. He was expecting a fierce, military leader—someone who would bust some heads and make some waves. So when he sends his men to ask Jesus if He's really "the one," Jesus replies with words John likely knew well, drawn mostly from Isaiah. It's not about winning a war, John. It's about winning souls. It's about healing minds, hearts, and bodies. It's about proclaiming good news to the poor. This is the Kingdom John was sent to announce—a revolutionary idea then, maybe even more so now. Where Did You See the Light Today? How might God be calling you to recognize the Kingdom in unexpected ways?

Whisper Prayer: Jesus, surprise me today with your quiet, healing joy.

Monday of the Third Week of Advent

Matthew 21:23-27

Where Did You See the Light Today? What part of your heart still resists giving Christ authority? What might shift if you gave him more?

Whisper-Prayer: Jesus help me yield to your authority with trust, not fear. You are gentle with power, and you use it to heal.

Tuesday of the Third Week of Advent

Matthew 21:28-32 "Which of these two did the father's will?" "By what authority are you doing these things? And who gave you this authority?" Where Did You See the Light Today? Have you ever said no to God, but found your heart drawn back toward him? Where is he calling you to follow through today?

Whisper-Prayer: Lord, give me the grace to mean what I say—and the humility to repent when I fall short.

Wednesday of the Third Week of Advent

Matthew 1:1-17 The book of the genealogy of Jesus Christ, the son of David, the son of Abraham. Where Did You See the Light Today? Where can you trace the quiet patterns of God's presence in your life—looking back or looking around? Whisper-Prayer: Lord, even when I feel like a small, nameless part of the story, help me trust that I matter to you.

Thursday of the Third Week of Advent

Matthew 1:18-25 When Joseph awoke, he did as the angel of the Lord had commanded him and took his wife into his home.

Where Did You See the Light Today? Have you ever obeyed without full understanding? How did God meet you in that surrender?

Whisper-Prayer: Saint Joseph, help me trust God's voice, even when it comes in silence or dreams.

Friday of the Third Week of Advent

Luke 1:5-25 Your wife Elizabeth will bear you a son, and you shall name him John. And you will have joy and gladness, and many will rejoice at his birth, for

he will be great in the sight of the Lord. Where Did You See the Light Today? What longsettled place in your life do you need God to reawaken with wonder?

Whisper-Prayer: God of the unexpected, help me believe that it's never too late for you to move.

Saturday of the Third Week of Advent

Luke 1:26-38 And coming to her, he said, "Hail, full of grace! The Lord is with you! Where Did You See the Light Today? Where in my own life of faith-however quiet or unremarkable it may seem—is God preparing to shine? Whisper Prayer: Lord, help me live a life so

anchored in You that when You call me, I am ready. Make me attentive, humble, and full of grace.






Faith Formation Spotlights Meet Our Catechist: Fr. Stiteler

We are delighted to welcome Fr. Stiteler to the Faith Formation team at St. John Neumann Parish, where he is now teaching 7th-grade Confirmation preparation classes. As a young priest with a background as a prosecutor, Fr. Stiteler brings a unique and relatable perspective to our students, one shaped by real-world experience, deep faith, and a heart eager to serve. He often reflects on the words of St. John Paul II: "Life with Christ is a wonderful adventure." For him, that has proven true again and again.

Born in Carlisle and raised along the banks of the Conodoguinet Creek in Camp Hill, he grew up the youngest of three boys in a home where faith, family, and friendships were central. His childhood was filled with Sunday Mass, time outdoors, and playing plenty of team sports, especially soccer, basketball, and baseball.

Fr. Stiteler graduated from Trinity High School before attending La Salle University in Philadelphia. After working for a year, he went on to Duquesne Law School in Pittsburgh and spent more than seven years serving as an attorney and prosecutor. Yet even as he pursued law, God was preparing a different path. A profound experience of Jesus' mercy in the Sacrament of Reconciliation opened his heart to the possibility of the priesthood, something he had never previously considered. Each time he brought this call to prayer, he found only peace and joy.



The Columbia Catholic Mental Health Ministry, in collaboration with Holy Trinity Catholic Church & St. Peter's Roman Catholic Church, will be hosting its Monthly Workshop on Wednesday, December 17 @ 7:00 PM at St. Peter's, 121 S. 2nd Street, Columbia, in the Social Hall and is open to everyone in the community.

The topic of this Workshop is **Trauma Informed Care** and will feature **guest speaker Garret Book**, Lancaster Behavioral Health Hospital Patient Experience Coordinator and a Certified Trauma Professional through PESI. Garret is a 2015 graduate of Lancaster Theological Seminary where he earned a Master of Divinity. 



Old Testament prophets were not very popular. Most were killed or exiled because they challenged people to follow the commands of God. John the Baptist suffered the same way.

So what kept the prophets going?

First of all, the prophets had faith in God. They believed that God spoke through them, that God would protect them and support them. Second, they had patience. They kept going when people rejected their preaching. Some prophets had to be patient with their own weaknesses. The third gift of the prophets was hope: That by keeping God's commands, God's people would be renewed, along with all of creation. Our first reading is an example of such hope, with its descriptions of deserts becoming gardens and the sick and disabled being healed and strengthened. So what do we learn from those prophets? First, we need to keep our faith in God strong. If you go to church once a week, the bare minimum, it would be like exercising only once a week and thinking that will keep you in shape. Second, we need patience and not just with our kids. We need to be patient with ourselves and with God. Some people stop going to church because they don't see any spiritual growth in themselves. So be patient; don't expect to become a saint right away. Finally, the reading from Isaiah gives us hope that God will open our eyes of faith, clear our ears to hear His word, (Is 35:5) and "meet him with joy and gladness" (Is 35:10).

SAINT JOHN OF THE CROSS

(c. 1542-1591)

December 14

How beautiful the experience of love for God and neighbor, a fire deep within! How disheartening when love suddenly cools; and our souls grow dark, our prayer arid. How painful when misunderstanding, even rejection, comes our way, sometimes from those we least expect. For all such "seasons of the soul," an inspiring fellow-pilgrim is the poet and mystic, John of the Cross. As a young Carmelite, he was recruited by Teresa of Avila for her Discalced ("barefoot," evangelical poverty) Carmelite reform, striving to renew the Church from within after the Protestant Reformation had led countless religious away. John suffered unspeakably harsh abuse, even imprisonment, from friars who rejected this reform. Yet during these times of deepest suffering, John composed spiritual masterpieces that still guide souls to God, their titles reflecting his own painful yet ultimately victorious journey: from The Dark Night of the Soul, through The Ascent of Mount Carmel, to his Spiritual Canticle and The Living Flame of Love. John summarized his spirituality simply: "Put love where there is no love, and you will find love."


Catholic Social Teaching Symposium - January 31


